## Hygiene Heroes Lesson Plan

## **Secondary**



## Set the Scene

Ask the children to start by themselves to think, then pair and share to come up with a list of essential things they feel they need in order to be able to take care of themselves comfortably.

Discuss and collect ideas as a class then agree on: Food, shelter, access to water and power, appropriate clothing, hygiene products e.g. nappies, toothpaste, soap, deodorant, period products, etc.

They might include leisure items in their list too such as gaming equipment, holidays, TV, etc. This provides an opportunity to discuss the differences between wants and needs

Now it's time for them to think about what toiletries and hygiene items they use daily.

### Main Activity This should take between 30–40 minutes

Explain that now they have agreed on what the key things are that are needed to be able to live comfortably and take care of themselves, you are going to get them to imagine a particular scenario and make some decisions about what to do.

Ask them to imagine they have £15.

In their groups they must decide what they think would be most important to buy from the list below:

Price	Items		
£10.00	Perfume/ Cologne	Laundry Detergent	Make-Up
£7.00	Acne Facewash	Hair Gel/ Products	Shampoo and Conditioner
£5.00	Toothbrush	Hairbrush/ Comb	Shaving Foam and Razor
£3.00	Deodorant	Shower Gel	Toilet Roll
£2.00	Period Products	Soap	Toothpaste

#### **Key questions:**

- Do you have enough money to pay for all these things? (No)
- Which would you prioritize and why?
- · How would you feel about not having any of those things?

**CAUTION** – these discussions should happen in a supportive class environment.

**REMEMBER** – there may be children experiencing some form of hardship for whom conversations may be upsetting or there is the potential for disclosures to be made. Be alert.

#### **Scenarios**

They only have the items they were able to buy. Ask them to consider how they think other people would react if they couldn't afford and consequently use deodorant, toothpaste, detergent, etc. and how that would make them feel.

Focus on the following situations:

- Going to school
- You are going to a friend's birthday
- Meeting with friends' after school



### Review

Discuss the difficult choices the groups may have had to make.

Show the statements which give examples of what Hygiene poverty is. Perhaps create a slide with Elisha's story and questions. Introduce the work of The Hygiene Bank and perhaps show this video.

Signpost who students can speak to or where they can go, if they need access to products or support.



## GO Follow on Lesson

What could we do to raise awareness of The Hygiene Bank in our community? This could focus on your school community or the local community.

Come up with some uplifting slogans etc. This could link to advertising or some persuasive writing if planning a longer project on the subject.

How could we, as a class, get involved with tacking the injustice of Hygiene Poverty. Write letters to MPs?
